Strengths:

- The department comprises of faculty members who are young, dynamic, dedicated and fully equipped to take up the challenges posed by the recent trends in the concerned discipline.
- The department is well endowed with valuable books including the recently published ones with reading room facilities. The department also issues books to both the teachers as well as students keeping the records maintained in an ordered way.
- The department has been publishing a standard academic journal titled "Dibrugarh University journal of English Studies" (*DUJES*).
- The department encourages its Faculty members as well as students to participate in the National and International Conference.

• Most of the students who have passed out from the department have managed to secure good Academic as well as Administrative jobs.

Weaknesses:

- The Research program including M.Phil, Ph.D. has been in abeyance since 2008 due to dearth of senior teachers. However from this year onwards Research Programs have been re-opened which will generate a research oriented teaching thereby serving the needs of prospective Research Scholars.
- The department lacks Post Doctoral Fellow which is very essential for personal as well as departmental growth.
- The department needs to be equipped with LCD TV monitor so that the students could be given exposure to new modes of AV interactive pedagogical practice.

Opportunities:

- The department would welcome Faculty Exchange Program with other National and International universities which would provide a platform to the teachers to engage in fruitful academic transactions on a global level.
- The department is capable of collaborating with foreign universities to initiate a Certificate Courses in areas like Spoken English and Communication Skills, Film Studies, Area Studies, Folklore, Cultural Studies and Popular Culture and so forth.
- The department is willing to initiate interdisciplinary academic engagemens and transactions with other departments within the Humanities and Social Sciences stream to conduct courses on History and Theory, Political Thought, Postmodemist Philosophy, Ecopoetics, Women's Studies, Translation Studies, Cultural Anthropology, Dramaturgy etc.

Challenges:

• Professional courses flooding the academic scenario with enticing job opportunities decent pay package seem to have impacted the discipline of Humanities and Social Sciences including English Literature significantly.

The department has envisaged a comprehensive vision document for the next five years. It includes –

- i) Work towards generating research of the highest caliber in terms of our departmental thrust areas so that enduring contributions could be made to the society in terms of producing quality research works which after publication would provide scholars in the field adequate inputs and knowledge.
- Since soft skills are given a great deal of importance now a days, certain selfsustaining soft-skill courses pertaining to effective communication skills would be introduced to students of the university and other interested applicants from outside. This course would serve the interest of the greater community of students as well as the department in generating some much-needed financial resources.
- iii) To make the CBCS system more effective, the department is in the process of offering certain credit and bridge courses to enable students of the various departments under the School of Humanities and Social Sciences to acquaint them with the knowledge and methodology pertaining to the discipline of humanities. The fact that interdisciplinary studies have been given so much of importance in the contemporary academic scenario, the department is in a position to offer students with a number of choices where the course tends to be interdisciplinary in aim and content.
- iv) Since the use of technology has become so necessary in contemporary pedagogy, the department envisions the need to have ICT facilities through which an interactive and participatory learning becomes the mode of knowledge generation, accumulation and

dissemination, apart from the traditional top-down lecture method that we still give a great deal of value, and continue doing so.

Library :

- The Department of History has a Departmental Library with stock of two thousand and six hundred books –mainly standard texts and reference books. Most of the books were purchased from the grant under SAP DRS-1 during the last five years.
- The Department of History has a Chair Professorship called Shri Shri Aniruddhadeva Chair Professorship. It has independent infrastructure facilities, funds, and a Library. This Library also contains more than a thousand books mostly on religious, social and cultural studies. The two libraries combine to form the Departmental Library of the Department of History.

It should be mentioned that the Library of the Department of History maintains one of the best collections of vernacular sources of the history of Assam.

E-facility:

The Dibrugarh University maintains a well-equipped Internet Centre, attached to its Library (Central Library named as Laxminath Bezbaroa Library). This centre is used by the students of the University in general irrespective of any Department/Centre of Study. Besides, the Department of History, has for itself, its own Internet Centre with 8 (eight) computers at present (2014) having internet connections for the exclusive use of the students. Students are encouraged to collect e-materials from e-archives, such as, the JSTOR, and other relevant documents in doing assignments and projects, collecting information, and doing correspondences.

Journals: Journals of Social Sciences, Humanities and Literature are available in the Central Library of the University. Students are, however, encouraged to consult the journals available in the INFLIBNET in the Department. Journals popular among and largely used by the students of the Department are *Economic and Political Weekly*, *Indian Social and Economic History Review*, *Journal of Indian History, Indian*

- Since majority of the students come from vernacular educational background and the medium of instruction in the post-graduate level in English, most of the students suffer from inadequate language skill which works as severe hindrance in their learning activities.
- Faculty strength needs to be increased to meet the demands of the CBCS and research activities.

Threats and Challenges:

- Decline in enrollment of students at degree level in colleges under Dibrugarh university is a potent threat for the future.
- Student quality is showing a downward trend and this is related to the above mentioned point.
- Misconception that history is not a career oriented discipline, thereby not contributing in employment generation.

51. Future plans of the department.

- The Department has already started the Second Phase of its SAP (DRS-II) on the Project *Religion and Society in Assam –Medieval and Modern Period*. The project started w.e.f. April, 2015.
- The Department has also started a *Centre for Buddhist Studies*. The UGC has approved the Centre with a starting grant of Rs.10, 50,000.00. Centre for Social Work Studies since its establishment in the year 2010, has been a prime source of imparting and propagating the social work theories and practices in this upper part of the stat. The centre has established itself as a core educational institution under the gamut of the social work discipline which endeavours immensely to inculcate the social work values and principles deep within the thinking cap of students. The centre through its sound teaching mechanism seek to germinate the seeds of an apt social worker in the minds of young students and direct them for a socially relevant purpose. This endeavour on the part of the centre has been equally blended with the broader aim to contribute towards the welfare and well being of the society, we all are part of.

Weaknesses:

- All the Faculty members are on contract basis.
- It is felt that induction of experienced faculties at higher position is necessary for the overall development of the Centre where P.G. courses are offered.
- The Centre is entirely based on fees collected from the students and hence the fund position is always based on students' enrollment. Therefore the Centre's Budget is limited and inadequate to run this type of courses.
- Centre does not have its own library and reading room. Besides it lacks modern teaching aid et.
- There is no separate computer Lab with adequate number of computers.
- There is no conference room where seminars/workshop can be conducted.
- Insufficient of Fund to procure Books and Journals.

Opportunities :

- There are ample opportunities to conduct research in the field of Social Work.
- Helping the Government and Non-government agencies to implement and assessment of plans and policies for the wellbeing of the people.
- Carrying out projects for the uplift of the weaker sections.
- Opportunity to create Human Resources who may contribute in social Work field.
- If the Centre can introduce two more specializations, Viz. Medical and Psychiatric and family and child Welfare it will definitely fulfill the demands of professional Social Workers in thematic areas which will be beneficial for Centre in the Long Run as the number of students are going to increase.

Challenges/Threat :

The uncertainty revolving around the future of the Centre and its evolvement as a department has been considered as one of the major threat; the centre seems to get subjected to. Often the prospect of 'a not so bright future' acts as a deviation of the concerned elements of a particular working place from their overall goal. The same runs true for Centre for Social Work Studies.

49. Details five major Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Challenges (SWOC) of the department.

Strengths :

The Department of Mathematics is having a good Departmental Library funded by regular annual grant from National Board of Higher Mathematic (NBHM), Department of Atomic energy, Govt. of India. The Department has been enjoying special funds from UGC, DST under SAP and FIST, this Department is also selected for SAP grant for Phase-II. Presently, Five on going Major Research projects are being funded by UGC and DST. Besides 10 number of regular faculty strength, five number research scholars are working as project fellow in different major research projects in the Department.

Weaknesses:

- This department has very little accessibility of research journals in print and in electronic form.
- The present infrastructure of the department is not capable meeting the requirement for research scholars. Inadequate floor area, old and unsuitable furniture for students, research scholars, faculties and office. Besides these, there is inadequacy in the overall structure.
- Computing facility in the department is not adequate, computer laboratory is suffering from operational, maintenance and routine software and hardware up gradation problem.
- Hostel facilities and other amenities for students of this department are very limited.
- There is no proper power backup system in the department.

Opportunities:

Research activities in the department opens many collaborative opportunities.

- Collaboration with nearby industries, and research institutions like BCPL, OIL INDIA LIMITED, ONGC, ICMR etc. for R & D analysis.
- Collaboration with Slovak Institute of Technology (Slovakia), Louisiana State University USA, for soft computing.

Challenges/Threat:

- There is a continuous declining trend of enrollment of students to the Post Graduate course in terms of quality.
- The absence of quality student input may affect the research activities and deliberations of teachers in classroom and eventually teacher's overall performance may suffer.
- The question of survival for the department may arise if more universities with good student amenities, better courses structure and with convenient infrastructure are established in close geographical area.

- Department of Mathematics has been striving since its inception in 1967 to adhere to the global standards in terms of Teaching, Research and the Outreach activities. The department is raised up to the present status through the visions and constant efforts by the faculty members. Following the footsteps of those visionaries, the department has been engaged in its efforts to make plans and implement them in succession. Following is a brief discourse of the plans that the Department has prepared for the next five years.
- (I) Academic Plans:
- (a) Teaching Plans: The faculty members are actively engaged in updating the Syllabus in timely manner keeping in view of the recent developments of the topic as a whole and the latest course curricula of the UGC/CSIR NET-JRF and GATE in particular. Following are few highlights of the plan framed for uplifting the teaching standard of the department.
 - (1) Teaching methods are to be updated with more emphasis on problem solving, webbased learning and peer-learning techniques.
 - (2) Constructivists approach will be adopted.
 - (3) Intra-Institutional collaborations will be facilitated. Under CBCS and the recently implemented school system, the department has already proposed to introduce interdisciplinary courses from Statistics, Physics and Economics etc. Initiating this move a lecture series on "Financial Mathematics" has been arranged in the department with Prof. M.K. Ghosh, IISc, Bangalore as the resource person. The department is planning to introduce a course on the subject from the next academic session. Some faculty members are also visiting IISc., Bangalore for training on the subject.
 - (4) Inter-Institutional collaborations are also planned. Recently some workshops, seminars, visiting faculty programmes have been arranged in the department so as to garner exposure on one hand and to highlight the potentiality of the department on the other hand. It is envisaged that such moves would enhance the Inter-Institutional interactions in a more fruitful way.
 - (5) More participation in the National Level Training programs such as Summer Schools, Winter Schools, Advanced Training Programmes organized by different premier institutions will be ensured. An initiative is already taken from 2015 where few of the students from the department were sent to Tezpur University for a training program

and few will be sent to IISc., Bangalore for the Summer Training program in July 2015.

- (6) The department will host a number of training programs in the coming years for both students and teachers, the first two workshops being held during August 2015 and December 2015 under the aegis of NBHM and SAP (DRS-II).
- (7) The department proposes to introduce an integrated PhD programme in addition to the existing Masters programme to facilitate research as a career. The curriculum is being framed.
- (b) Research and Development: The faculty members and the research scholars in the department are actively involved in quality research on various topics in Mathematics. The department is awarded with SAP (DRS-II) by the UGC for the year 2014-2018 after successfully completing SAP (DRS -I). A sizeable number of research publications is produced during the last few years. As part of the Research and Development plan, the department would thrust upon the following.
 - (1) Publication of quality works in journals of high reputes.
 - (2) Project Mobilisations under various funding agencies.
 - (3) Inter and Intra-disciplinary research activities especially with Life- Sciences, Bioinformatics, Bio-Technology, Computer Science, Economics etc. will be encouraged.
 - (4) Collaborative research will be given high priority.
 - (5) Exchange programmes of the research scholars between institutions will be continued. This is already initiated with IIT, Bombay in 2015.
 - (6) The departmental Journal "Mathematical Forum" having ISSN (0972-9852) will be made online from 2016. It is indexed and abstracted in the Mathematical Reviews of the American Mathematical Society (MathSciNet). Efforts will be made to get the journal abstracted in other abstracting and indexing agencies.
 - (7) Five National Seminars are proposed to be organized in the Department during 2014-2018 as part of the SAP (DRS -II) funding. One has already been held. The remaining four are to be organized within the next four years. It is planned to publish the proceedings of these seminars in special volumes of the departmental journal "Mathematical Forum".
- (c) Outreach Activities:

Considering the fact that most of the students of all levels have Mathematics phobia, the department has been continuously engaged in its efforts to popularise the subject and also to bring about motivations for the subject. Since 2002 the department has been organising summer camps for School children in the nearby remote rural areas with financial support from Dibrugarh University. The department has also organized Mathematics training programs for students and teachers on many occasions. It has been celebrating Ramanujan Day on 22nd December every year to create awareness among school and college students towards the subject.

The department will continue its effort for the coming years and it is planned to organise more training programs. Already initiatives are made in this regard and two training programs for the teachers and students of the colleges affiliated to Dibrugarh University in particular and the entire north East in general called "The Mini MTTS" and "The PTMT" programmes are approved by the NBHM, Govt. of India to be held in December 2015 and July 2016.

- (II) Plan for Infrastructural Developments:
 - (a) SAP Grants: As already mentioned the department has received the SAP(DRS-II) grants for its overall development from the UGC, under the non-recurring head of accounts, a number of infrastructural development projects has been underway. Under this grant it is planned to develop the following.

- (1) A well equipped Computer Laboratory.
- (2) A virtual classroom with video conferencing facilities.
- (3) Cubicles for Research scholars with all modern amenities.
- (b) NBHM Fund: The NBHM funded library in the department has almost 7000 books. It is planned to procure more books on recent and emerging areas and also back volumes of journals with the future grants.
- (c) Other Agencies: The department plans to apply for funds for Infrastructural Developments for other agencies in the future. Moreover it will apply for SAP (DRS -III) after completion of DRS-II

Weaknesses

- Limited know how on the subject, PEX-205 (Geophysics) by the faculties. Training of the faculties should be imparted in National Geophysical Research Institute (NGRI) in Hyderabad.
- Insufficient skill and techniques due to minimum collaborations with high tech research institutes like CSIR Laboratories and IITs.
- The major equipments brought during the TIFAC CORE project under DST from Houston, Texas is not in working condition and occupying space in the laboratories like scrape materials. These

require huge capital for repair and maintenance, hence not done as yet.

• Limited experiences in reservoir modeling and simulation with the help of latest softwares.

Opportunities

• The funding organizations like the different components of the Ministry, Govt. of India, which basically favors the development of the department in particular and the university as a whole.

Challenges/Threats:

- The Petroleum Engineering department of Dibrugarh University Institute of Engineering & Technology (DUIET) unfavorably influences the healthy growth of the department in terms of Campus recruitments and field training of students in the nearby oil industries.
- Biasness is being observed regarding the Campus recruitments of our students by Training and Placement Cell.
- Changing procedures/approaches of oil industries during field training of our students is a major threat as they are mostly confirmed to classroom lectures instead of field training.

- 50. Details five major Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Challenges (SWOC) of the department. Strengths:
 - The Centre is the only one among all the Universities/Institutions of the North-East India carrying out Research and Teaching in Space and Atmospheric Sciences.
 - The Centre has completed eight sponsored projects (ISRO RESPOND – 3, ISRO Space Science – 2, ISRO SAC-1, UGC SAP DRS-1, ISRO CAWSES-Phase-I) and at present six projects are ongoing 9ISRO GBP ARFI, ISRO GBP ATCTM, ISRO GBP-SSPS, UGC SAP DRS-II, DIT, DST-FAST TRACK).
 - The funding received till date is INR 350 Lacs (Approx.)
 - A total of 14 sophisticated instruments (13 imported) are available in the Centre for both Ionospheric and Lower Atmospheric measurements. Besides data from multiple satellites (Indian/International) are also used for the research in both the areas.
 - So far 11 students have been awarded Ph.D., 6 M.Phils and 3 M.Techs based on research carried out in Space and Atmospheric Sciences utilizing the facilities available in the Centre. Eight of the Ph.D. scholars were full time paid research fellows. The centre also offers a Post Deoctoral Fellowship in the ISRO GBP project.

 - Scientific collaboration has been established and a MoU signed with the German Weather Service (DWD) Agency and Institute for Meterological and Climate Research, Karlsruhe Institute of Technology, Germany for running a global climate model.
 - In active collaboration with Research Institute for Applied Mechanics, Kyushu University and Goddard Earth Science and Technology Centre, NASA.

Opportunities:

- Climate change and Space weather are two major topics of recent scientific and public interest all over the world. The Centre's involvement and expertise in these two areas has attracted a geed number of bright dedicated students over the years to its fold.
- Research and training provided in the Centre has equipped the students to grasp the opportunities at national and international levels. Four students successfully completed the Advanced Post-Graduated Diploma course conducted at Physical Research Laboratory, Ahmedabad followed by M.Tech awarded from Andhra University, by the UN sponsored Centre for Space Science and Technology Education at Asia and the Pacific (CSSTEAP). One student has participated in the International 'European Research Course on Amosphere' at Joseph Fourier University, Grenoble, France and 'International workshop on Remote Sensing' sponsored by COSPAR at Greater Noida, New Delhi.
- Two of the alumni from the Centre have been placed in the country's leading Space Research Organization-ISRO as scientists while one senior alumnus is at present head of a Division in the premier CSIR institute, NEIST.
- The Centre also provides facility to carry out short term (summer/winter) projects for outstation students.

Challenges:

- The primary area of weakness in the Centre is lack of sufficient permanent faculty member to diversify and take the present level of work to the higher and challenging domain, basically regional and global climate model (both Atmospheric and Space).
- The lack of faculty has also constrained the Centre from initiating the second objective of offering M.Sc./M.Tech. Course in Space and Atmospheric Sciences which is expected to enrich the present level of Academic Excellence of the University.
- Another major area of concern is creation of awareness among the students at the UG level about this scientifically and socially challenging area. Atmospheric or Space science is not taught at lower levels and hence an apathy or unawareness exists among students. This may be remedied by offering a basic course in Space and Atmospheric Sciences at an appropriate UG level remedied by offering a basic course in Space at an appropriate UG level sciences at an appropriate UG level both for I.M.Sc. and regular B.Sc. Students.
- As the Centre is not running any taught-course and hence is unable to generate any income other than from the sponsored agencies sustainability and expansion of its present activities in future remains uncertain.

51. Future plans of the department.

The major new initiative of the department in the next five years will be the continuation of its Ph. D programme in collaboration with Laboratories like SPL, VSSC, PRL, ARIES etc where the students can carry out their dissertation work. Collaboration with these laboratories is being planned in order to involve Scientists from those institutions as Ph. D supervisor for the research scholars working in the Centre. Visiting Faculty Scheme will be continued for the M. Sc., M. Phil and PhD courses.

Strength and Weakness:

Admission through entrance test is maintained in a systematic manner to ensure a quality intake of students. The centre has shown good pass percentage of students every year. The teaching learning process focuses on a disciplined course work. The process is continued in an ICT enabled environment for better an effective communication to the students. Periodic seminar presentation as well moot court helps the students in sharpening their skill in presentation. Compulsory internship programme for students are also conducted. The students also learn the basic skills of research through study of judgment of the Supreme Court and High Courts. These help them to asses and analyse new dimensions of legal development with the assistance of teachers.

However, the course work does not leave much scope and time for any advanced learning of logical oral presentation. Further, all the students do not get the opportunity to speak in the moot court or seminars as it is tasked to group of students. Logical and spatial thinking is important for a lawyer ; this area is not adequately addressed in the study curriculum which needs to be worked upon by incorporating more problem solving and report writing at the undergraduate level. Periodic address by eminent professors, lawyers, judges etc. On subjects of emerging and converging areas of law would also help the students immensely. The Bar Council of India the apex body controlling Legal Education in the Country does not leave much scope to make changes in course contents or methods of study as subjects and number of classes in each of them is specified and regulated. There is a need to enhance the ICT facilities for teachers and students. Considering the need of the course the infrastructural facilities also needs to be improved.

Opportunities : The students after completion of the study can join the Bar as lawyers or can get job in judiciary or in the corporate sector. The students in the graduate level have an option for specialization which help them in the long run to acquire more knowledge in the area for the development of a career n law. Students get opportunity to practice presentation of facts and law, which eventually prepare them for legal practice. This degree also provides a window to join other services in the state as well as Union government.

Challenges: The major challenge is to enhance the recruitment opportunity of students after completion of the course and to keep a track of the employment status of the passed out students. The starting of a placement cell at the department is to impart the skills and nuances of recruitment test such as group discussion and personal interview. It is also necessary to expand the library and to bridge the digital divide by providing adequate number of computers with internal facility to the students. Further, being a self financing institution the centre is deprived of UGC funding as such the status of the institution needs to be changed from Centre of Study to a regular University department so that the Centre will be able to apply for Faculty Development programmes from the UGC and other funding agencies.
