The University Administration Building and all the departments are equipped with silent generators of which few are with on-line UPS. Aluminium chokes are replaced with Electronic chokes. Streets lights are equipped with LED bulbs. The CFL and Neon bulbs of the University buildings and departments are being replaced by the LED bulbs in a phased manner. University hostels, laboratories of the science departments and quarters have been connected with pipe gas facility. Chemical and biological hazardous waste (solid and liquid) are disposed regularly with necessary precautions. Litters / rubbishes / trashes, scraps, solid and e-wastes are properly managed and disposed off. Initiatives are being made for GREEN Audit on the campus. The process of setting up more Biodigesters and a Vermicompost Unit is in process.
